Keurbooms River Nature Reserve.

a World Heritage Site, is an exquisite, small reserve of 740 hectares located in the lush Garden Route region just outside Plettenberg Bay.

The Keurbooms river passes through the reserve bringing an abundance of water from further up in the Tsitsikamma and Outeniqua Mountains through the stunning estuary on its way to the ocean.

Only 8km away from the busy seaside town of Plettenberg Bay, Keurbooms

Climate

Warmest temperatures are normally experienced between November and March and range between the high twenties and low thirties, with February typically being the hottest month. The lowest temperatures are normally experienced between April and September, with the coldest temperatures usually recorded during July.

Flora

The deep protected valleys and kloofs are covered in Afrotemperate forest with the plateau being vegetated with typical grassy fynbos. The reserve is a sanctuary for indigenous trees, including the Cape beech, white stinkwoods and the beautiful Outeniqua yellowwoods. Keurbooms River Nature Reserve is a lush destination filled with an abundance of plant life.

Fauna

Twenty six species of mammals have been recorded in the Keurbooms River Nature Reserve. Of these, only the blue duiker is considered a threatened species. Bushbuck, baboons and bushpigs are frequently sighted on the Reserve.

Visitors should look out for the guirky vervet monkeys, the shy blue duikers, beautiful grysbok and mongooses. Those patient and lucky enough could even spot elusive Cape leopards.

An abundance of river and forest birds inhabit this region and provide a musical background to the lush surroundings, with contributions from the Knysna Loerie, Pied and Half-collared Giant Kingfisher, Knysna Woodpecker, Sunbirds, Yellow-billed Ducks, Fish Eagle, Little Grebe, Black-headed Oriole, and Narina Trogon. A total of 177 species of birds have been recorded, of which 63 are known to breed within

The Keurbooms and Bitou rivers are home to four indigenous freshwater fish species namely the Slender redfin, the Eastern Cape redfin, the Cape galaxias and

Reserve rules

- No pets are allowed inside the reserve, irrespective of whether they are inside a boat or a vehicle
- Vehicles are not permitted on the beach.
- · Fires are only allowed at designated braai areas
- · No firewood allowed. Bring your own charcoal.
- · Spear fishing and the transportation of spear fishing equipment is not allowed in any inland waters.
- Remember that you are responsible for your boat's wake.
- Please observe the speed limits of the different zones on the river.

gives visitors the chance to experience the drifting, hypnotic rhythms of life by the river on kayaks, canoes and boats, gliding through silky water while gazing up at the forest above, listening to the chorus of birds.

Named after the Western keurboom tree, the reserve contains an unspoilt gorge and protected kloofs and is a favourite destination for both local and international travellers. The Keurbooms river can only be explored by canoe or boat.

Activities

Many of the activities at the reserve revolve around the waterways including boating, fishing, canoeing, and water-



Angling is permitted at the Keurbooms River Nature Reserve, but a fishing license is required. Fishing licenses are obtainable from the post office or online at E-permit at https://www.fishing.dffe.gov.za



Visitors are welcome to swim in the river. Children should not swim unsupervised.



Visitors are welcome to picnic at one of three designated spots along the river these are only accessible by boat or by canoe. The canoes can be hired at the entrance gate. There is also a large picnic area at the entrance gate with braai facilities.



There is an abundance of river and forest birds that inhabit this region.



Double canoes and kayaks can be hired per day at the entrance gate. Canoe and kayaks cannot be booked (first come first use). The cost includes lifejackets and oars. Motorized boat users must be in possession of a valid boat permit.

Facilities

Whiskey Creek Cabin is located 7km upstream from the main entrance and comfortably sleeps 10 guests in four double bunk beds and two single beds. The cabin has an open-air kitchen shaded by a veranda roof, and an expansive deck with a braai area. Guests need to bring all bedding and food. Pillows and pillow cases are provided. Firewood is available on site. Only rain water is provided.

Whiskey Creek Cabin can only be reached with an approximately two-hour paddle on the river. This can take longer if paddling into a headwind. We recommend that visitors leave no later than 14h00 in summer and 13h00 in winter to ensure they make it to the cabin well before nightfall.

Note that the canoe might have to be pulled across the rapids by hand during low tide. When getting out of canoes, extreme care must be taken on slippery rocks. Children must be accompanied by adults. The rapids can be challenging and the walk to the cabin is 400m requiring a reasonable level of fitness.


Visitors will be required to sign indemnity forms and wear lifejackets, helmets and water shoes when on the river. We do NOT supply water shoes, so please bring your own.
